

Side 1

Don't invite bears into your backyard!

Alaska Department of Fish & Game regulation
SAAC 92.230 makes it illegal to negligently
leave out food and garbage
in a manner that attracts bears.
The penalty is \$50.

What you can do



Use bear-proof trash containers.
Otherwise, keep your garbage airtight
and odor free, and store inside until
pick-up day. To find out where you
can get bear-proof trash cans, visit

Don't feed birds during active bear
season – late March to early November.
(Birds don't need supplemental food
during this time anyway.)



Install electric fencing to keep bears
out of corrals, chicken coops and
rabbit hutches.



Store fish remains in tightly sealed
containers until garbage day. Keep
fish cleaning areas as odor free as
possible.



Store pet food inside. Bring in bowls
as soon as your pet is finished eating.

Side 2

Feeding bears is against the law!

Alaska is a unique place — it's the only state in the country with a healthy population of brown and black bears living in close proximity to cities and towns. Most Alaskans believe bears enhance their quality of life here. Unfortunately, in the past five years an increasing number of bears around the state have been destroyed for feeding on birdseed or improperly stored garbage and pet food.
